## H. N. Mattison Retires After 52 Years as County Treasurer

Retiring after more than half a century of service as Orange County treasurer, Hiram N. Mat-tison looks back over more years as public officeholder than is usually credited to any one man.

ually credited to any one man.
When he was appointed County treasurer in 1898 by Ass't Judges Fitts of Braintree and Kibby of Bradford, William McKinley was President of the United States. Edward C. Smith was Governor of Vermont and Curtis S. Emery was clerk of Orange County.
To many of us, this seems a long time ago, but Mr. Mattison's reminiscences of those times and events, and his stories relating to his long term of office, are so clear they seem but yesterday.

As he relates, the duties of the office of Orange County treasurer are many and varied. As county

er are many and varied. As county treasurer, proper, tax warrants are sent out each year on Feb. 10 to each town in the county to be collected on or before June 1. He pays all orders drawn by the County cierk; and on February 1

County cierk; and on February 1 he makes a report of the financial standing of the county.

The County treasurer is agent for Grammar School-lease-lands in Orange County, there being 3 towns having this class of lands. They are Braintree, Brookfield, Chelsea, Orange, Randolph, Vershire, Washington, Williamstown, with 53 parcels of such land. The yearly rent amounts to about \$416 which is paid over to the school boards of these towns for school purposes, whereas several years purposes, whereas several years ago this rent went to seven schools: Bradford Academy, Chelsea Academy, Corinth Academy, the Newbury Seminary, Randolph Center Normal school, the Randolph Graded school and Thetford Academy.

also the trustee of the David Poor Fund. This is a fund of \$1000 which was left by David Poor of Corinth, the income of which was to pay the tuition of worthy and needy students in the higher institutions of learing in this county. By reason of failure to call for assistance from this fund, it accumulated to over \$3,800. In more recent years, when the law required that towns pay the tuition of all students. Judge Miles ruled that this income might be used for board, clothing and other necessities of worthy and needy students. Report on this Fund is made to the Chancellor, who is the presiding judge at the November term of County Court.
